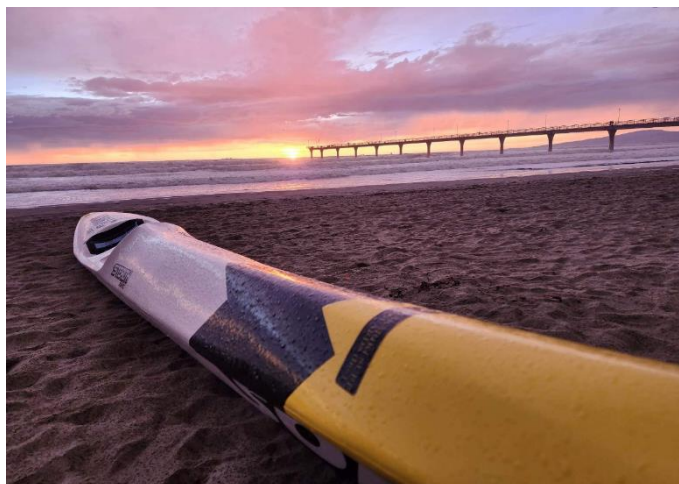

Chair's report

Paekākāriki Surf Lifeguards had a very positive season despite the challenges we faced as a club. After navigating through the pandemic and operating without a clubhouse for another year the Paekākāriki members came together extremely well to deliver a safe beach, run a great sporting season, and provide valuable services to our community. This says a huge amount about our people and how resilient and resourceful we are. I must thank everyone for the effort you all put into making this happen so well this year.

At the start of the season we had athletes start training mid-winter on the inlet and as we rolled into summer we moved much of the training up to the beach. This was again a real challenge for storage of gear and lack of facilities and I must thank our coaches and parent helpers for the support of our various programmes.

Although there were many challenges faced, we had a very good sporting season capped off by great results across all of the Regional and Nationals events. This year we saw many teams and individuals on the podium and putting in inspiring performances across boats, craft, junior and IRB racing. A real highlight was seeing our members being challenged by a massive surf at the Christchurch Nationals and coming out the other side with brilliant results.



Lifeguarding was very hard for our members again this year and it was a real relief to have the use of the Black Dog container to base our patrols from. Our lifeguards once again kept our beach safe for users, completing over 2000 hours of patrol and we were also involved in many other activities away from the beach including some of our experienced members travelling to Hawkes Bay to help with flood relief.

We managed to upskill many of our members this year including qualifying 10 new lifeguards and refreshing 73 existing lifeguards. A big thanks goes to our instructors and coordinators who put a lot of expertise into making this happen. Congratulations also goes to those new lifeguards qualified this year. Thanks also goes to all of our lifeguards that patrolled the beach and helped with events and callouts. As a club, we have a very strong group of lifeguards with a huge amount of skill.

In November we demolished the old building which was a sad time for the club. We had a farewell and blessing for the old clubhouse and it was great to see so many of our older members and supporters present at this event.

Although this was a sad occasion it marked the beginning of a new era for the club. The progress on the new building has been exceptional and is reported on later in the annual report.

A Club is only as strong as its members and the success of the season is all due to our hardworking members. I would like to thank all of our members for their efforts this season. One group I must thank is the club committee and Laura our club administrator who have done a fabulous job in making sure all the gaps were filled and the club could function well. Thank you all.

Lifeguarding

The start of the season begun with the demolition of our club and while this was tough to watch, it was a step forward towards the future. While the season came with a number of challenges once again patrolling out of containers, I am extremely proud of how everyone rose to the challenge and made the most of a less than ideal situation. With the new club on the horizon, our lifeguards brought positivity and enthusiasm to the beach that hasn't been seen for a couple of seasons and I was extremely proud of their performance this season.

I want to give a massive thank you to Black Dog Consulting for the use of their container once again. You were integral in keeping our lifeguard services running and kept our lifeguards dry on those not so pleasant days, we thank you for everything you have done and continue to do to support our lifeguards. A big thank you also needs to go to our lifeguard subcommittee for everything they do to ensure the smooth running of our lifeguard services. A special mention to Ben Strombom and Ally Jones who stepped up massively to keep our lifeguard services running when we lost our Director of Lifesaving just before the start of patrols. Also, to Grace McCarthy for being Patrol Captain for the first few patrols of the season and getting our facilities in order and to Mike Ward and a number of other lifeguards who helped him to create a more user-friendly beach access ramp next to the patrol tower and for putting new posts under the patrol tower to ensure we can continue to lifeguard from it safely.

This season we had 11 new lifeguards join our team. A big welcome to our newest lifeguards Ella C and Ella D, Hazel, Chloe, Stevie, Katya, Mae, Ben, Travis, Yasmin and Emily - you all did a fantastic job in your lifeguard exam with the examiners speaking your praises at the local LLC meeting. Our instructors did an outstanding job of ensuring trainings ran smoothly and candidates were prepared for their new role. A number of our instructors were also involved in mentoring and instructing at Intermediate Guard School and WOW showcasing the level of skill shown by our instructors. We are really lucky to have such a dedicated group of instructors within the club and this shows in the calibre of our newest lifeguards.



This year we had 50 refreshed and actively patrolling lifeguards which is a little down on previous seasons but not unexpected given our current circumstances. Together they completed a total of 2,080 hours of patrolling as well as performing 5 rescues, 14 assists, 1 search, 1 major first aid and 12 minor first aids on our home beach with many more completed by our lifeguards at beaches around the country. One of the rescues performed this season would have most definitely resulted in a fatality if it wasn't for our guards so you should all be very proud of

yourselves. I'd like to thank everyone who wore the red and yellow uniform this season as well as the huge number of volunteers behind the scenes that keep our lifeguard services running smoothly.

On top of our regular volunteer and regional guard duties, our lifeguards once again helped patrol a number of local and national events including the Wellington Ocean Swim and the Kapiti Woman's Triathlon, we look forward to working with them again next season. A special shout out should also go to our event guard team. This team spent countless hours on the water ensuring the safety of our competing athletes. Their dedication not only ensures the smooth running of competitions, but they bring their skills and experience back to Paekākāriki.

A number of lifeguards worked to upskill throughout the season, gaining awards and experience in a range of areas and we are grateful for their dedication to improving their lifeguard skills. Special mention to Ava Jones who attended Intermediate Lifeguard School. Together our IRB instructors Ben and Riley continued to upskill our up and coming IRB drivers and crewman and are looking to start training back up at the end of June. It was awesome to see the supportive and welcoming environment that the boys have created at their trainings and I'm excited to see this continue to grow in the coming months.

As the season draws to an end, we look forward to the coming one and the exciting things it will bring in the lifeguard space. While we are looking at another season patrolling from containers, the end is near and there is the very real possibility that this may be our final season doing so. Looking toward next season Ben Strombom will be taking on some of the responsibility of the Director of Lifesaving role as I begin to step down. I look forward to the fresh ideas and a much-needed new perspective he will bring to the role as he leads us into this new chapter.

Surf Sport

Seniors

After a couple of years with fairly small squads, this year felt like we may be at the beginning of a building phase when we were joined by 6 new under 15 athletes. A shout out to the Nipper programme who has kept these athletes in Surf lifesaving.

Winter training began at the usual time and the winter and spring of 2022 were pretty good to us with plenty of calm days with reasonable weather which meant we had plenty of quality trainings. Within a couple of sessions, the new members were capable on a ski and we were into it. It was a real reminder to me that those winter sessions on the harbour are so important to allow their confidence on the ski to develop.



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Due to a change with my work roster, I could not make some trainings and I must thank McKenzie Jones who ran the bulk of those trainings in my absence. McKenzie and Bronagh Ryan also took on the role of mentoring and guiding the under 15 girls which was awesome.

As per the previous year we were once again blessed by calm conditions for most of the season. This year we had the added bonus of having one of the best summers in years which meant that we had warm weather and warm seas. This may have been just as well because we were of course lacking the clubrooms, however it was awesome to at least get a toilet block.

Despite having nowhere to get changed, no hot showers, nowhere to get out of the weather, along with limited gear storage options, I never heard a moan all season. That is a real credit to the squad and just goes to prove it's not about the building and all about the people.

Whilst the Wellington weather was good to us, the rest of the country was coping it and this was reflected in the out of District events that we attended. Our first hit out of the year was at Whangamata, however unusually we were hit with strong onshore winds and large seas, which after training in fairly flat water put us to the test.

As per the last few years, central regionals at Fitzroy was a great event. The continued trend of northern clubs attending gives the event added legitimacy. It is a great atmosphere, and this should see them continuing to travel. Our athletes did well with heaps of medals across the board.

Eastern regionals were an unusual experience where large onshore conditions at Mt Maunganui saw a transfer to the harbour. As if that wasn't enough it absolutely poured down for the whole event. Despite swimming pool conditions, pouring rain and last-minute altered courses our guys just got on with it. Congrats to the U19 boys with Alex Cecioni winning the Surf race and then combining with Ben Reiher and Ben Norris to get medals in the Taplin relay and Board rescue.

Just when we thought we were over the threat of Covid shutting down Nationals (at Christchurch) we were suddenly hit by "Ferry gate", where the Interisland Ferry that our gear trailer was booked on broke down and it became obvious that our sailing was likely to be cancelled. A huge thanks to Duncan Chamberlain who rallied and managed to get the trailer transferred to his booking and saved the situation. Also, a big thanks to Mike Bennett who did work on the trailer and enabled it to travel.

Nationals! Well, we got the gear there, but the drama was not over. We were faced with massive swells which put the most seasoned athletes on edge. These nationals will go down in legend for the size of the waves. For those who entered the surf, they can rest fairly comfortably that they may never have to take on that size wave again. Alex was on form again and gave the club its first gold medal for several years in the board/ski/swim arena when he emphatically won gold in the U19 Run/Swim/Run.

As usual thanks to all those who assisted throughout the season. As always, Marco Cecioni did heaps, Teri Anderson did heaps, and Karen Simpson stepped up with organising Nationals. Also, thanks to Emma Norris who has been applying (very successfully) for grants and this year, amongst other things, we got to add 5 new Surf ski's to the gear shed. Looking forward to next year already.

Surf Boats



There was a bit of lethargy around the start of this season, as we all come to grips with beginning and planning the year ahead after two years of cancellations and disruptions due to covid.

While there seemed to be a lot of enthusiasm and numbers keen to row, other than our open women, the majority of our crews didn't really kick into gear till around November. Much later than we would generally start, which only added to a very slow start for the boat section compared to previous years.

Despite this slow start however, crews did fall into place and began to settle into good training habits, which resulted in the season really taking off in the new year.

After much discussion amongst the sweeps over the Christmas/New Year period, we decided on a big push on the social side of the sport, to really build the interest/friendship and rivalry between the crews. Multiple crew morning trainings at the club on weekends followed with bagels/coffee in the village. Or afternoon trainings followed with dinner at Finn's really got the crews going, and developed a good culture of working hard while also making the time to enjoy each other's company.



Central regionals in Taranaki as always began the start of multiple trips away, and also started the beginning of what would be a very successful season results wise for us. While the open woman (Tumbleweeds) did 4 weekends in a row away (Taranaki/ Piha/ Mt Maunganui/ Waihi), the next big event for the section as a group, was the North Island champs in Waihi. Big surf was on offer, along with medals for our Open woman/ masters' men, and U19 men and women.

By now we were operating 7 crews and the section was on fire, as we pushed hard in the final 6 weeks leading to Nationals. Like everything in life, we all get the occasional situation sent to test us, and for the boaties (and others), we got one in the form of the Cook Strait ferries deciding to crap themselves, and we were in the serious situation of not being able to get boats to Christchurch. With much angst, and much wheeling and dealing, we managed to have one vehicle and boat delivered to Picton. The details of the transaction that enabled this to happen can't be written down, but suffice to say, it is a story that legends and club histories are built on, and for the price of a handle at Finn's. You may be able to con a boatie into relaying the story to you.



Finally arriving in Christchurch for Nationals, and thanks to the generosity of Rob Van Krimpen (our U19 men's sweep) allowing us to use his personal boat and with the use of a Waimari club boat as well, our crews attacked the task of qualifying for finals in the huge surf that greeted us. Three days of the most perfect racing conditions turned this into a Nationals to remember. Little wind, blue skies and consistent 2-3m surf all weekend, tested rowers and sweeps alike for the entire weekend. All crews performed exceptionally well, but special mention must go to our open women (gold and silver), U19 woman (2 golds) and U19 men (silver). Season results are listed below.

I must make mention of the big strides we made this year in our sweeping department. Always one of the hardest positions to fill in a boat section, and the Achilles heel of most clubs. We were lucky enough to have the return and emergence of three extra sweeps this year, which came as much appreciated relief to Steve and I. Ethan, PJ and Rob came on board and did a fantastic job of sweeping and coaching our two U23 woman's crews and our U19 men respectively. All three showed great commitment to their crews and added another layer of talent to our sweeping stocks. Our boat section is in great hands moving forward with this great bunch of sweeps.

Finally, a massive thanks to all our helpers through the year. Parents, partners and friends who have helped feed and water the troops while away, moved trailers and boats up and down the beach, and have just been fantastic positive supporters of our crews through the year.

Thanks as always to PJ and Rachel (Black Dog Consulting) for their financial support and use of minivan for country-wide travel, and for providing their farm for our end of year boatie bash. Mr. X for getting our boat and

van to the South Island. Carpentry Plus, SDR Flooring and North City Bricks and Blocks for picking up those niggly small expenses through the season.

Special rower mentions to Rachel Reid who filled in at trainings and events for pretty much every crew through the year and finally filled in at nationals for our open women after injury ruled out Hayley from their crew. Hayley Goertzen for her work above and beyond with boat towing and maintenance, and then graciously being beach manager and boatie hype girl at nationals when a back injury prevented her from racing with her crew. India McMahon who transferred from Titahi Bay to row for our U19 girls after a serious injury at Waihi ruled out their bow girl Anna, and thus enabled them to successfully finish the season. And finally, to the Tumbleweeds who helped me personally with multiple admin jobs through the year.

Thanks to the club and committee for your ongoing support of our boatie section, and also all our boaties who train out of a carpark in Mana and make all those sacrifices required when part of a team to train at all times of mornings/ days and nights to fit around their crew's life commitments.

The season kicked off with a number of development days, followed by a development weekend held at Riversdale Beach. A huge amount of experience was gained during this weekend with some challenging conditions. A number of Paekakariki candidates were signed off as IRB drivers and we look forward to the coming season and getting a few more signed off.

The competition calendar began a little later in the season this year with two crews, our U23 men of Rhys and Ben and our open men Dwight and Tyler, attending the Opunake dash for cash (an event celebrating Opunake's centenary) in February followed by North Islands in March and Nationals in April.

IRB North Island Champs were held in the beautiful Waipu Cove. The open men's crew of Dwight and Tyler were the only crew to compete and the results weren't what we were hoping for but they still finished strong with a bronze and a handful of finals.

After some damage to Whangamata Beach and the surrounding areas the decision was made to move IRB Nationals to Waihi Beach. Once again, the open men were the only crew to attend and it was a rather disappointing end to the season. With the surf and wind up, the tough but inevitable call was made to cancel Nationals after the completion of just one event. Despite this we still managed to walk away with a silver medal.

Looking towards next season, IRB training starts in a couple of weeks. Riley and Ben will continue to run these with some new IRB instructors looking to join the team too. This is exciting and shows development and work we have been putting into our drivers. Junior Surf

Paekākāriki nippers have gone from strength to strength this season, even with the lack of club rooms. Over one hundred nippers registered for our Sunday afternoon programme, and we regularly had 40-50 nippers on the beach each week (which made those parent helpers especially important!).

The U11-U14 age groups were smaller than in recent years, with many of our long-time nippers moving up into the seniors. Despite their small numbers, they showed outstanding dedication and progression. Board training started in October, with six nippers coming along for the first time with freshly minted 200m badges. The early start for board training paid off once the nippers got to Oceans where the Mount put on a big surf. The U11-14 age groups trained through the season together and became a tightly knit team, with a strong pool of regulars at all training sessions and carnivals. It was great to see them supporting each other, with the younger nippers gaining lots of valuable skills and lessons from the older kids.



We have big numbers in the U8-U10 age groups which is promising for the future of our Lifeguard programme. The U8-U10 nippers also had a very dominant season in the Capital Coast region, which is equally promising for our junior sports programme. The younger age groups came along to each Sunday session with boundless energy. A few of our newer members eased into the season, as we learned the basics of wading and dolphin diving. Once they got their caps wet there was no looking back, and a highlight of this season was seeing the younger kids insisting on putting their body boards to one side (very unusually), in favour of surf swimming and body surfing. These age groups continued to grow in number after the Christmas break, with new members coming along to the club through word-of-mouth.

Our Thursday night pool sessions were also a huge success this season. Nippers were active in both the programme and lap pool at Coastlands Aquatic Centre. With the large group of U10s coming through, we had a lot of interest and friendly competition in completing 200m badges. By the end of the season, we had 40 nippers successfully renew or achieve their 200m badges (including

several of our U8 nippers).

Carnivals

SLSNZ Capital Coast carnivals were back to their old pre-covid format this year, seeing some great action and very long days on the beach. Carnivals got off to a rocky start with the cancellation of Worsler Bay due to heavy rainfall, which felt ominous after last season saw multiple cancellations. However, all other Carnivals went off without any issues, with regional carnivals being held at Titahi Bay, Riversdale and Lyall Bay, Central Regions at Fitzroy Beach, and Oceans at Mt Maunganui.

We had an average of 31 entries in the regional Carnivals this season, with a high level of dedication from this group. After the cancellation at Worsler Bay, the remaining Carnivals put on great conditions. Riversdale in particular saw some big surf which challenged the nippers in the water and took its toll on a couple of Boards. Spirits remained high throughout and by the time the Capital Coast champs came around at Lyall Bay, our nippers were seasoned competitors. Paekākāriki had a great turn out for the regional champs, taking away third club overall, along with 8 age group medals, and 44 event medals overall.

Oceans

We had a hard-working crew of 9 athletes travel to the Mount for Oceans. Our athletes trained up to five times a week, and completed Board training at least twice a week from October onwards. Training was varied, and including evening ocean swims in Raumati, and an impromptu friendly weekday Carnival for regional clubs in Titahi Bay on a Tuesday evening.

Oceans were a massive highlight of the season. The sense of team spirit amongst the nine athletes was strong and the events were well run by officials. The February cyclone in Auckland, the Bay of Plenty and Hawkes Bay impacted many clubs, and it was encouraging to feel the sense of togetherness within the Surf Life Saving community so soon after the weather event. The cyclone also impacted the conditions, with a rough shore break requiring a good level of technical skill from nippers (and an even stronger dose of courage).

A new move to using composite teams for relays meant the athletes got to take part in as many races as they were up for. Paekākāriki was also able to enter a mixed Grand Cameron relay team at the event. There was only a smattering of rain, otherwise sun and smiles ruled the day. One of our nippers, Felix, also scored an outstanding second place in the U14 boys beach flags competition too.

Well done to Humphrey, Abigail, Lily, Asher, Jordan, Felix, Jack, Lola and Elsa for their hard work.



Next year Felix, Jordan, Elsa and Lola will be moving on from our nippers programme. We'll miss them at the next Oceans, and wish them the best of luck moving up into the seniors.

New Building funding

We are extremely grateful to Kapiti Coast District Council (KCDC) for being our first major stakeholder, to Mayor Janet Holborow for being such a stalwart supporter and to Mike Mendonca for 'thinking outside the square' to get \$1million of funding across the line. Such fantastic proactive support from them both, as well as Sophie Handford and a very supportive Council. Without this backing we would have struggled to get further funding from other sources. Their commitment enables us to approach other funders and was a major contributor to receiving the other grants.

Thanks to both NZ Community Trust (NZCT) and Pelorus Trust who have significantly donated to the project (see below). On top of this donation, Pelorus also donated \$60,000 which covered the costs of the building demolition, as noted above. A huge thanks to Quality Demolition who providing their services at a heavily reduced price. One of our own, Ben Strombom, drove the digger that demolished the club in November. A very emotional time! Coastlands came on board to sponsor our Nippers programme and donated \$60,000 to the new building.

The Give-a-little "1913 Club" has been a great initiative, thanks to Sarah Sherriff for spearheading this. It has raised \$25,000 so far. We encourage members (and anyone you can inspire to join you) to sign up for regular donations. This will automatically join you up to the "1913 Club" and entitles you to a 1913 Cap and other goodies over time.



Our aim is to have \$3.2m confirmed by the end of July 2023 which will enable us to engage contractors 'Homestead' to begin the building through to 'close-in' stage. We then need another \$1.5m to do the finishing and this may consist of fundraising, donations, further funding applications (of which we have a number we are planning to approach) and a large portion of 'in-kind' donations of products and services. Much of this will be reliant on members and their contacts and we will be calling 'all hands on deck' when it comes to this stage.
